Duncan's Extreme Chocolate Mousse

400 eggs
20 lbs. sugar
1 gallon orange liqueur
250 lbs. semisweet chocolate bits, melted
50 lbs. white chocolate bits, melted
40 lbs. softened unsalted butter
½ gallon strong coffee
1 pinch of salt

Combine first 3 ingredients in medium Jacuzzi.

Slowly add next 5 ingredients while stirring constantly.
Increase speed gradually until mixture is light and fluffy.
Serve chilled.

Metz's Musings

As the holiday season approaches and we feverishly try to set the Perfect table, the talk always turns to what wine to serve...

Pinot Noir is one of the most food-friendly red wines. With flavors of black cherry, warm spices, orange peel, and earthy notes, this versatile wine has soft tannins with a bright acidity, and a smooth finish. Pinot Noir is much lighter bodied than other red wines like Cabernet Sauvignon, Zinfandel and Syrah. However, if you like a lighter red wine you can also turn to a Gamay or Grenache. Earthier, more tannic Pinot Noir wines pair well with meats such as pork, filet mignon and game dishes. Stews, wild mushrooms, and root vegetables also make good pairings with Pinot Noir. A classic pairing is Beef Bourguignon.



Fun facts about Pinot Noir:

- Likely originated in Burgundy, France.
- Enjoys the same climate as Chardonnay. You'll often find these two grapes planted close to each other. Think Santa Barbara, Carneros or the Russian River.
- Blanc de Noirs Champagne uses Pinot Noir (and Pinot Meunier) as its base grape.
- It's one of the few red grapes that's commonly made into red, rose, white and sparkling wine.
- DNA analysis has revealed that Pinot Noir, Pinot Gris and Pinot Blanc are simply mutations of the same grape!

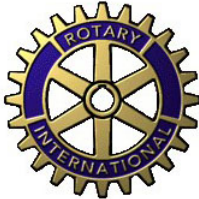
